BHHS 58th Annual General Meeting



Heritage Week Lecture — They came to Whitehorse

We are delighted to announce a talk by Emeritus Professor Graeme Davison, AO, FAHA FASSA, FFAHS,

to kick off the 2022 Heritage Festival. Graeme is Australia's foremost urban historian, and the author of *The rise and fall of Marvellous Melbourne*, as well as a number of other books. He will reflect on how COVID has led us to appreciate the values in our own streets and neighbourhoods. Using the Windsor Park estate in Surrey Hills (where he lives), Graeme will discuss how our forebears thought about these questions, and the more limited sense of community that such places embodied. He will then consider what we now look for in our suburbs and what heritage contributes to it.

It has been a mixed couple of months, as various volunteers have had to isolate because they had caught COVID themselves or were close contacts. We had to close our premises on one Tuesday because there was a chance I had inadvertently infected things when the President came down with COVID.

The main activities have been, firstly, the preparation of material for the forthcoming Heritage Week events. In this, I give a big 'thank you' to Caitlin Stevens for her help with the *Box Hill Vignettes* online production. Secondly, much time went into the sorting and pricing of some 46 boxes of donated books, and a large collection of our own ephemera. A report of the book sale is elsewhere in this Newsletter. Indexing of the rate valuation books has continued, however, with another 2 books being finished.

New acquisition: Box Hill Senior Citizens records. This club has now closed, and we were invited to take what we thought appropriate for our archives, as they needed to vacate their building in Carrington Road. The club, first formed in 1956 as the Elderly Citizens Club, had a good collection of minute books and photographs, which we have added to our archive, ready for future cataloguing.

Vale Bev Hill

Former Society member Bev Hill died on 16 July 1922, after being in care for some years. This brief tribute has been compiled from the records of the Society.

Bev was born in Bendigo c.1923, and attended Bendigo High School and then MLC. She worked firstly as a government clerk, and subsequently for an advertising agency. She met Box Hill native Raymond Hill at a Methodist Church camp, and after marriage, the pair lived in Broughton Road before moving to 45 Strabane Avenue in 1974.

Bev and Ray were highly active in the Mont Albert Methodist Church, where Bev became a Sunday School teacher and later Superintendent of the Sunday School. She also had an involvement with local Girl Guides for many years. Both Bev and Ray were members of Box Hill Lions Club over a protracted period.

Ray was elected to Box Hill Council in 1971 and became Mayor in 1974, with Bev serving as Mayoress. They were both very supportive of the Matsudo Sister City relationship, made some 11 trips there, and hosted a number of Matsudo citizens in their home. Both, in turn, were named as Honorary Citizens of Matsudo.

In 2002 Bev and Ray were named joint Whitehorse Citizens of the Year, the first time the award had been made to a couple.

Bev was a member of the Society from at least 2011 to 2018, and a regular attendee at our meetings. The committee extends its condolences to her family.

Recent speakers

William R Orange

David and **Marlene Pietsch** gave a joint and illustrated presentation to the **June general meeting** about the **History of the Lutheran Church in Box Hill.** Both are long term parishioners at St. Paul's, with David a former chairman of the congregation and project manager of the relocation to and redevelopment of their new site in Riversdale Road.

Marlene began with some background to Lutheranism in Australia: Lutheranism is a small Christian denomination of German origin with pockets of members in areas including the Barossa Valley, Adelaide, parts of Queensland and the Wimmera and Western Districts of Victoria. The first Lutherans in Melbourne came here directly and settled in Waldau (Doncaster) in the mid-19th century. They were well regarded, kept the German culture and links to the homeland and saw themselves as loyal Australians.

Early services were held in the home of Gottlieb Thiele (*Friedensruh*), then in a small church built in Doncaster. (Trinity Lutheran Church in East Melbourne was built a little later.) Some division of views lead to the construction of a larger church, St John's, in City Road Melbourne in 1928: St John's gathered a congregation from across Melbourne. In 1947 a survey of this congregation found a concentration of Lutherans around Box Hill: post war immigration and the movement of displaced persons had brought these people to Box Hill. The congregation initially met in a room in a grand Victorian house *Shadmani* in Nelson Road, rented for £55 per year and set up for church each Sunday.

Their first pastor was the energetic, pastorally caring and musical Ed Leske—he paid many visits to members of his congregation during his first few months. A block of land was purchased in Station Street near Medway Street for £850 then another block on the corner of Elland Avenue (from Methodist medico Judkins) for £1000 and preferred as a building site because of its proximity to the town centre. An architect was engaged and after a couple of proposals (and more land purchased) a design was approved. The government building controls at the time restricted building materials, but Pastor Leske's persistence at government achieved permission to build in the desired brick. Part of the fundraising program included a pledge of one week's wages over and above the weekly pledge until the building was paid off. A parishioner, Bill Richter, was engaged as builder, with assistance from voluntary labour and regular Saturday working bees and an on-site cement mixer.

The foundation stone was laid in November 1952 and the church opened in April 1954; 3 services were required to cater for all the attendees on the day. A hall was subsequently built on the south side of Elland Road, later occupied by the Open Book bookshop (who brought copies of Gordon Moyes' book *When Box Hill was a village* for sale in Box Hill). The hall was eventually sold and in 1980 properties to the north in Station Street were bought for the manse, and later in 1987 to build a new hall and offices adjacent to the church.

The congregation now is again more regional, with members from as far as Braybrook, Hoddle's Creek and Port Melbourne. They are attracted by the brand, with a strong musical tradition led from the 1970s by Alan Collyer, a fine musician and organist, a regular weekly choir and liturgical cantata performances. The Parish supported children's homes in Surrey Hills and Nunawading, later in Box Hill for children who were orphans or in other difficult situations in the past: a children's ministry has continued until recent times. A Chinese congregation has been established with a 'Speak English' group and a Saturday morning Mandarin service.

About seven years ago, other pressures related to the small footprint of the Elland Avenue site became more evident, as David Pietsch went on to explain. The small footprint limits on site parking and Station Street has become increasingly congested on both weekdays and Sundays. After analysis and advice from consultants, and consultation with the congregation about the possible options, an architect was engaged to prepare plans for a high rise building with parking and church facilities on the site. (Now it is possible that the SRL project with plans for the area directly to the west might compulsorily acquire the site.) At the same time about eight sites around Box Hill had been considered for possible relocation, then in 2016 St. Paul's became aware that the St. James' Wattle Park church site was likely to be sold. After 2 years of negotiation the St. James' site, including church, housing and the car park opposite, was purchased and the Elland Avenue site sold by tender to Hong Kong toy maker 'Early Light' for \$28.5M. The church, designed by Chancellor & Patrick, has a heritage overlay and is early modern in style. LAW architects were engaged to draw up plans for an extensive renovation and upgrade of the St. James' building, including relocation of St. Paul's pipe organ to the existing organ loft and original furnishings to a new chapel in the St. James building.

Recent speakers (cont.)

In February 2020 a program of activities was planned and run to farewell the Elland Avenue site. It concluded with a final service on 1 March, a bright sunny day, and a processional walk through the shops and Surrey Park, with many of the participants carrying small items from the church, to the Wattle Park site, a welcoming service and afternoon tea. Lockdowns for COVID-19 ensued, so the new St. Paul's was dedicated in May 2020 with restricted attendance. Now (in June 2022) the church is in full operation with plans in preparation for the balance of the site. The talk concluded with some questions about the financial and planning logistics in the move, and a vote of thanks from the writer, who has personally enjoyed the musical tradition and legacy of St. Paul's Lutheran Church.

Happy memories of working at Box Hill Town Hall

Sylvia and I both commenced working at the Town Hall in 1957 on the same day, and have remained firm friends ever since.

Sylvia worked in the Rate Office as a comptomitrist with Mr Logan. In April the rates are due, so on 10 April there would be a queue out of the door and down the ramps, as people were paying on the last day they were due.

It was so busy that Mr Arrowsmith, the Cashier, had to put all the notes in a large rubbish bin so, when it was full, it was taken to the safe and another rubbish bin found.

Sylvia was always busy as the job entailed printing all the rate notices each year, and always when new properties were sold, as they were needed for conveyancing.

I commenced work with the Deputy Town Clerk, Mr Leigh with typing and administration. Those days you did not call an officer by their given name — it was always Mr Leigh.

After 2 years I worked with Mr Mitchell the valuer, which was a busy office, as each property sold had to be changed in the Valuer's records books, as well as new cards had to be typed as there were many new estates and subdivisions, particularly North and South Wards.

This office also typed up and collated all the Voters' Rolls for the 4

wards, which took many weeks. These were typed onto a stencil, which was then placed on a drum filled with ink (a Gestetner) then printed. Each page had to be done like this. They were collated in the Council Chambers and I still remember the room completely covered in piles of foolscap paper for each ward.

The Salk Vaccination program came to Box Hill and I assisted the Council's Medical Officer, Mr Scott. We travelled to all the schools and Baby Health Centres in the district to immunise all these children. I remember we also had sessions in the Supper Room, [lower town hall] where 600 children would be immunised in a morning. It could be bedlam!!


Sylvia and I wanted to travel to the UK for a holiday. We saved up for 3 years, keeping a strict budget. To save money, we would cut a lipstick in half and place it in a used lipstick holder. Winter being cold, we bought one malted milk (hot) with 2 straws! Our wages the(n) would be—Sylvia £8.00 per week and myself £7.60.

Three years were up and we were off for the trip of a lifetime, by ship! Five very happy years spent at the Town Hall.
