President's report

In the present locked-down situation, there is little I can report in regard to what the Society has done in the period since my previous report. What I *can* report, however—and have pleasure in doing—is a couple of things that have been done not by us, but for us.

Firstly, thanks largely to the secretary's efforts, the Society has been awarded a grant of \$1000 from Whitehorse Council for the purchase of a new computer and printer/scanner, to be used in the Heritage Centre. This will allow us to replace a 15-year-old computer with the latest model

Secondly, we have recently received a generous donation of a large number (somewhere between 100 and 200) of used archival-standard photo albums, plus a large number of various sized acid-free inserts, all in very good condition. This offer (which we were pleased to accept) came out of the blue from the Focolare Foundation, based in Box Hill North. Focolare is Italian for 'hearth' and the Foundation (which is global in reach) promotes the ideals of unity and universal brotherhood. The gift of these acid-free photo albums represents in excess of \$1000, so is most appreciated.

Archivist's report

In 2019, in preparation for Heritage Week, I spent many hours at the Public Record Office looking at Council correspondence files for the period 1913 to January 1927and taking over 1000 digital images. Initially, I planned to record the reports of infectious diseases, including the 1919 influenza outbreak, [indexes to these are on our website] but quickly discovered that there was other interesting material too, including letters from residents on a wide range of subjects. Something of the variety of topics covered in these letters can be appreciated from the following examples.

The residents of Bank Street wrote in 1914 regarding the 'totally inadequate provision of proper drainage for sewage and stormwater' while James Simpson of Beatrice Ave wrote in 1916 that 'gardening with me is a hobby' and complained about a wandering cow destroying his plants. In the following year, Blanche Cornell of Lorne Parade complained of her neighbour, artist Theo Brooke Hansen's chook sheds, while James McDonald of 6 St James Avenue reported an 'abominable stink' from a dead fowl in his neighbour's rubbish bin, and the abusive behavior of said [unnamed] neighbour. In 1921 the 'women of Carrington Road' complained about the state of that road, and in 1922 the 'ladies of Brougham Street' petitioned the Council for an additional street light, writing that 'for some weeks past women have been accosted by a man who emerges from the embankment'. Also in 1922, Clarence Weber of 2 Victoria Crescent complained about leaking sanitary pans being delivered, and in the following year, still unsatisfied, reported the matter to the Health Department. Interspersed with these letters were business registration forms; applications for Council employment; and, in the period 1916–1918, lists of members of sporting clubs. In 1924 there was even a petition from primary school children; and in 1913, a swimmer's complaint.

Shire of Nunawading correspondence files

[This letter was found at the Public Record Office in VPRS 9548, inwards correspondence files of the Shire of Nunawading. It is presumed a Councillor was on the swimming club committee.]

Charles H. DAWSON 530 Collins Street Melbourne Woollen Merchant

Oct 21 1913 Committee Box Hill Swimming Club

Secretary & Committee Gentlemen,

On Sunday October 19th, having been for a swim in the Dive & on entering the Pavilion again I found my Dressing bag had been opened & my clean towel extracted & some one had used it & after having used it had wiped their feet on it.

Now as Vice President of the Club I think the Committee should hear about such treatment according to one of its members. I could not find out who had done it for there is about 3 or 4 who was in it & I for one think the committee should take action & I take it in this manner it is no good in the interests of the club to have one or more members who do dirty low tricks of this description in the interests of the Club the club would be better without them [.] I can name 3 or 4 who had a hand in it & if any member cannot have an enjoyable swim & at the same time be certain of a clean towel which is his own property it is time to have different members. Moreover the damage done last year the Committee can look to its own Club members for the doing of that damage & I for one certainly think two or three irresponsible members want expelling as one in particular is the Ring leader of a certain sect, also the language on a Sunday morning is enough to make the air blue.

In conclusion gentlemen I should feel more satisfied to place my resignation in the hands of the Committee if they think fit and have nothing further to do with the Dive seemingly in the future paying subscription will only be for the benefit of being insulted.

Box Hill Primary School 1924 petition

This petition, in the form of a letter, with 291 signatures attached, was given by the headmaster to Mr. A. H. Serpell, the acting correspondent of the school committee. He forwarded it to the Council, with an accompanying letter that supported the children's request. When the Council met they agreed that the Engineer and the local Ward Councillors, would investigate. Did the children get their playground? Not straight away. While the Council did set aside an area in the park for a playground, there was a need to put an open drain underground first, and that cost money that the Council didn't have. Four years after the children's letter, with the drain undergrounded, Dr Luke in his annual report again urged the Council to install play equipment there, but instead a tennis court was built. It would appear to be some time after 1930 before play equipment was finally installed. Empire Park, as it was called, was subsequently known as Box Hill Gardens. The majority of the land had been purchased bv Council in 1920 from the Rodgerson family.

The following is a list of the children who signed this petition to Council. An asterisk (*) after a child's name indicates that the student was in Grade 5.

J. J. Box Hill. No 28 38. To the Box Hill Thire bouncil. Gentlemen We, the c upper grades of the Box Hill Isate request shad you will be good chool, enough to place seesaws, swings, and other appliances for amusement in Empire Park. The schoolground is not large enough, and Empire Park is quite to the school. close Dr Luke, when giving us a salk on health, said shas it would be a good thing if this piece of ground, could be made into a park for the child ren. It would be a fine shing for their health. If you will do this, we promise not make the park unsidy, and not to hurs or destroy any plants or buildings placed there. We are willing to constribute at least threepence each sowards the cost. We remain, yours sincerely,



Local businesses, 1921


An interesting source of local information I found recently on one of my infrequent visits to the town hall, is a small booklet titled *The Suburban Guide and Business Directory*. Published in 1921 and costing 3d., it provides a snapshot of the district, some small business adverts, and a fascinating street map. The latter shows some street names that do not exist today, including George Street, now Glenmore Street; Albert Road, now Arnold Street; and Clifford Street, now Victoria Street. The adverts, a couple of which are reproduced here, were for a range of businesses, including:




